# Mistake Made by Many

Jonah 1:11-15

The book of Jonah deals with obedience and the consequences of disobedience. Jonah is the primary character of the book, but others were also challenged to trust God's direction instead of their own desires. When Jonah fled from God and secured passage aboard the ship going to Tarshish, the crew of the ship became involved in his situation.

God sent a storm because of Jonah's disobedience. It was a terrible storm that produced great fear in the crew. As the storm became stronger the sea grew more violent. The sailors feared for their lives and looked for a way to calm the storm. Jonah had made it clear to these men that he was the reason for the troubles. Since Jonah's disobedience brought the storm the men may have concluded that he would know how to calm sea. The crew, after looking to their gods for help and finding none, turned to Jonah. He told the men what God demanded, "Take me up, and cast me forth into the sea". That's what God required and that would bring peace to the sea.

The crew heard Jonah and provided an answer, their verbal response may not have been recorded but their actions reveal the decision. Instead of throwing Jonah overboard they worked with all their might to reach land. Perhaps land was visible from the boat or maybe they knew where the land was located. Either way, they chose to work for their safety instead of following God's direction. The sailors worked for a good cause, their lives and the life of Jonah. Life is precious and should be respected. Shame on those, that claim Christianity but endorse abortion and euthanasia. These worldly men had greater regard for life than many in our churches today. The sailors were extremely sincere in their work; this effort came from their hearts. The motive behind their work was to save The themselves and Jonah. sailors worked with great diligence, rowing until they could no longer row, these veteran sailors had a limit and it was eventually reached. The problem is that they worked against God. The work was done good intentions, faithfulness, diligence and sincerity; but it was done in disobedience to God's directions. The Lord had sent the storm and provided a way to bring peace, but it was not by their strength or might. Peace would come with obedience to God.


The hard work was not completely in vain. They accomplished three things. First, they concluded that they could not save themselves. Their work got them nowhere, the sailors found themselves exactly where they began, in the middle of a violent storm. Second, they realized that their work would not bring peace to their lives. The sailors found exhaustion and hopelessness but land and peace were still missing. Third, the crew came

to the understanding that they needed God. Though they had worked hard, they had failed and were without hope. The sailors did what should have been done to begin with, they cried out to God for mercy, followed God's direction and found peace.

God allowed the crew to work until they realized that their efforts were useless. God has allowed many to work. He allowed Cain to bring his works to the altar, the Pharisees to offer their works of righteousness and people to work for acceptance. What must be remembered is that God does not accept human works for salvation. (Ephesians 2:8-9; Titus 3:5) God demands obedience to Him. Adam and Eve fell because of disobedience and many remain in their sins because of disobedience. God has provided the answer to our sinful condition, His Son Jesus Christ. Since God is our creator, He determines the way for us to come to Him. Jesus summed it up best when He said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." (John 14:6)

Many are making the same mistake as the crew did that day, works instead of obedience. Eventually they will come to the same conclusion, peace is only found when God is obeyed. Hopefully, that understanding will come while there is still time to turn to God through Jesus Christ.






